MEMBER SPOTLIGHT SHINES ON HAL MILLS

This month's member spotlight shines on a Carotel Pioneer who resides in the seafood capitol of the world! Meet Hal Mills and his wife Cheryl, of Calabash, NC. Calabash isn't a long drive from the CT&T territories that Hal traveled for work for nearly 40 years!



Hal's foray into telephony started in December 1959 when Hal accepted a job in Fayetteville as an installer-repairer. In October 1963 he transferred to Chadbourn as a sole representative in the installation/repair department where he handled the Chadbourn and Bladenboro offices. In 1964, he was transferred to the Whiteville office as the first PBX person to work in the Whiteville district.

In 1969, Hal's career took him to the assignment world, and he served as a union representative during that time. He didn't love the assignment job, though, and when he was contacted by the division manager about an outside job, he gladly accepted the change, and he joined the line worker crew in 1973.

Hal became the head craftsman on the line crew in the mid 70's and worked there until January 1987. During that time, Hal's wife Cheryl worked as a home health nurse in Robeson County and the couple lived in Tabor City. Cheryl's closest patient was 51 miles from her home, and by 1987 she was more than ready to reduce her commuting hours. Hal was able to return to Fayetteville as a cable splicer and after Cheryl swapped territories with a co-worker, she

typically didn't have to drive more than 10 miles to visit her patients.

Hal continued to work in Fayetteville until he retired in November 1999 with nearly 40 years of telephony service. Cheryl retired three years ago.

Hal and his first wife, Margaret had two daughters, Melody (Stephens) and Susanne (Leggette). Melody blessed Hal with two grandchildren whom he has loved dearly. Hal's grandson Matthew was killed in an auto accident in 2019 at the age of 18.

Hal's granddaughter Maggie McKenzie made Hal a great grandfather three years ago when his great granddaughter Avery was born. Maggie is expecting a baby boy in the next few months and the family is eager to welcome him into the family.

Hal met Cheryl through mutual friends in 1983. Although both were from Tabor City originally, they didn't know one another until the friend insisted they meet. Cheryl was a nurse at Columbus County Hospital.



The wife of one of Hal's good friends worked with Cheryl and they were both eager for Hal and Cheryl to meet. Both finally agreed to meet at the home of their mutual friends and Hal said of that meeting, "I went to check her out and to get a free meal." The couple found they had plenty to talk about because while their paths hadn't crossed in their hometown, Cheryl knew Hal's parents and several other family members, and Hal found that he knew Cheryl's parents and a number of her relatives. The couple began dating and they were married in March 1985.

Hal also has a son who formally joined the Mills family as a young adult. Russell Dean Barker learned in 1993 from his older brother that he also had two sisters. As a freshman at the Air Force Academy, Dean contacted his sisters while on temporary assignment in Fort Lee, Virginia. Melody and Suzanne arranged to pick Dean up for a weekend visit, and when they told Hal about the planned visit, Hal asked them to find out whether Dean would be willing for him to drive Dean back to Virginia.

Dean's initial visit with his newly found family members was a great experience for all of them, and the trip back to Virginia proved to be a bonding experience for father and son. Before the visit ended Dean asked Hal what he should call him. It didn't take long for Dean to tell Hal he'd like to call him "daddy." Hal enthusiastically told Dean that's what he had been hoping for.

Dean became an integral member of the Mills family. and in 1996 Dean legally changed his surname to "Mills." Dean and his wife Jennel have given Hal and Cheryl four more grand-children: Brooklyn 8, Mason 6, Mackenzie 2, and Elaina who was born in February of this year.

Cheryl's biological child, Julia, was adopted by Hal after they married. Julia and husband Jamey Steffen have one daughter, Amelia Caroline. Julia blessed the family with more grandchildren in an extraordinary fashion. During college, Julia donated eggs to a fertility center. The fortunate parents who received Julia's eggs told their daughter, Samantha, that she was a test tube baby when she was about ten years old. Samantha later researched her biological roots and she found Cheryl's dad, who is now 101 years young!

Through that connection, Samantha was ultimately able to locate Julia when she was a senior at Campbell University. She wrote a letter to Julia expressing her desire to meet. Julia eagerly met Samantha, and Samantha was quickly assimilated into the family. Hal and Cheryl both have been delighted to add Samantha to their list of grandkids.

Hal has been a faithful Carotel Club member for many years. He and Cheryl have been long time attendees of our annual Carotel convention when schedules and health have allowed.

Hal recently reminisced about his working days and the lasting friendship he formed with Ralph Johnson, who passed away earlier this year. The two couples enjoyed catching up whenever they attended Carotel's fall conventions.

Hal and Cheryl both have recently had some health concerns and haven't been able to connect with other Pioneers as much as they would have liked. In 2022, after we resumed our conventions after COVID-19, both Hal and Cheryl were ill.

Cheryl was diagnosed with stomach cancer in September 2023 and was unable to attend that fall convention. After a series of chemotherapy treatments that ended in February, Cheryl had surgery this past March at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York, New York. Cheryl remained in New York for two weeks after surgery for follow-up visits.

The surgery was complex, and Cheryl's recovery has been a daily challenge, but Hal reports that Cheryl is improving some each day now. have missed Hal and Cheryl in recent years, and we wish for them better days ahead.

The national ITPA was founded in 1920 by members of the independent telecommunications industry as a way to serve the communities they lived and worked in. The Carotel Club was formed on July 1, 1971 under the previously existing Tar Heel Chapter. The club initially consisted of members who were employed by Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company and required 15 years of service as a condition of membership. Over the

years, the club's by-laws were revised, as companies were merged and acquired, to welcome Sprint and Embarq telecommunications associates, and the required length of service was reduced. In recent years, a new membership category was adopted by the ITPA to allow "Friends of Pioneers" to become Pioneers. And we need new members! Invite someone today.
