-Updated technology in the National ITPA office


-(Much needed) membership dues adjustment

ITPA Charitable Foundation President, Darlene Roll, extends a sincere thank you to everyone whose donations help us help others.




Historical Foundation News

Once located in Washington, D.C., ITPA's National Office and Museum relocated in 2001 to the small, beautiful city of Hinesville in Liberty County, Georgia. Nestled beneath the majestic oaks draped elegantly with Spanish moss, the National Office occupies the former family home of Glenn E. and Trudie Bryant. Mr. Bryant was a pioneer for Hinesville, Liberty County and the telephone industry alike. He was the founder of Coastal Communications. He bought the Hinesville Telephone Company in 1946, later acquired the Coastal Telephone Company in Richmond Hill, GA and merged the two under the name of Coastal Utilities (now operating as CenturyLink). Bryant, who died in 1999, also served as a Georgia State Senator and was a visionary in business, political, community and charitable ventures. His philanthropic legacy is carried on by the work of the Glenn E. and Trudie Bryant Family Foundation.

The ITPA Telephone Museum consists of a vast collection of telephones and telephone equipment from throughout history. Children and adults alike may find it fascinating to see how the telephone evolved from the solid wood, wall mounted, hand cranked, operator directed, simplistic designs of the past to today's pocket sized, touch-screen, cellular phones. Our collection of artifacts features several hands-on displays that are sure to take you back in time and an interactive kiosk that teaches telephone history.

The museum's most prized artifact is a wooden transceiver which was used by Alexander Graham Bell while he was on vacation at Natural Bridge, Virginia. This valued piece was donated to the museum in 2007 by C.P. Lamm a former employee of the Virginia Telephone and Telegraph Company with headquarters in Charlottesville. Virginia. This company pur-chased the Lexington Telephone Company from the Audustines on April 1, 1958, and they sent him to Lexington, VA, to work with the Lexington Telephone Company employees. Mr. Lamm included the information provided here after regarding how he received Bell's receiver that he later decided to donated to the ITPA Telephone Museum.



"Natural Bridge was one of the five exchanges operated by Lexington Telephone Companv. During this assignment. I contacted all of the larger Lexington Telephone Company Customers, including the Natural Bridge Hotel. While visiting this customer, one of their employees, an elderlv (80+years) bellman asked me to accompany him to the hotel basement where he wanted to give me a telephone instrument that "Mr. Bell" used while at the hotel. According to this employee, Mr. Bell visited Natural Bridge on several occasions and stayed at the hotel. There was no telephone service available in Natural Bridge at that time, so Mr. Bell requested that the hotel install a circuit between the hotel and the railroad station. Mr. Bell provided the telephone instruments."

Mr. Bell used the wooden transceiver, which both transmits and receives communications, to connect to a line service at the hotel which allowed him to connect with an operator to place a call.

Visitors to the museum are amazed to find out that we have an instrument that was used by Alexander Graham Bell.

If you haven't yet visited our museum, we welcome you to visit. Even if you have visited, come on back and you're sure to find something new...well you're more likely to find something old...but it's worth a repeat trip. Come on down!



Darlene Roll Honored with Pioneering Excellence Award

Congratulations to Darlene Roll, this year's Pioneering Excellence Award recipient. This Award is the highest individual honor bestowed by the ITPA. Recipients are Pioneers who consistently contribute to their communities through ongoing Pioneer activities and who enhance the ITPA and its goals; and Darlene has certainly done that.

Darlene has participated in fundraising efforts such as Alzheimer's Walks, March of Dimes Walks, Bikes Across America, and has helped donate to food pantries, Veterans Hospitals, and much more. Her ever-positive attitude is contagious and the Mid Ohio Pioneer Club has thrived with her influence.

Darlene's Pioneering spirit led her to the national level when in 1994 she accepted a role as director on the ITPA's national board. She was elected Region 2 Vice President in 1997. During her tenure she traveled to all clubs in that region and assisted every club when possible. (In 2020 she again accepted that position for another term.)

Darlene served as National ITPA President in 2001-2002. She is currently the President of the ITPA Charitable Foundation. Darlene said of her service to and on behalf of the Pioneers, "It's the feeling of 'family' that I get...and I hope others do as well...when working on a project to fill a need."

Many Pioneers are well aware of the projects she has championed and the offices she has held. **But did you know....**


She married her late husband Barney at a church camp! She was blessed with four stepchildren and five grandchildren.

New Pioneer Membership Category Approved by Assembly Delegates

Club delegates unanimously approved a proposed amendment to the ITPA By-Laws, adding a new membership classification to Article IV.

Under the new Friends of Pioneers classification, individuals who do not have a direct affiliation, present or past, with the telecommunications industry are eligible to become members when they are sponsored by an active Pioneer member in good standing and they are at least 21 years of age. After a one-year grace period, Friends of Pioneers members who are current on their annual dues will be granted voting rights and may hold office. Friends of Pioneers may participate in all activities of local chapters. clubs and the National Association including attending the National Assembly.

The Recipe Exchange

Sensational Spinach Dip

This recipe is from Cindy Downing (Comporium Club). Cindy served on the assembly committee this year and prepared a yummy spinach dip that was enjoyed by many in the hospitality room. Ingredients:

1—10 oz. package of frozen spinach 1—16 oz. container of Sour Cream 1 cup Mayonnaise

11.4 oz pkg Knorr Vegetable Soup Mix (this is a dry mix)

1 1/2 cups grated Swiss Cheese

Preparation:

Thaw spinach and press out all of the water until it is dry. This will take a few minutes. Set aside.

Combine remaining ingredients and then add spinach. Mix well. (Dip will be thick.)

Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours before serving with your favorite crackers or chips.

Baking Tips and Tricks

Keep cookies and other baked goods soft and same-day fresh by storing them in an airtight container with a slice of white bread.



They'll feel and taste freshly baked even after being stored for several days.

If you forget to soften your butter, cut the cold butter into small cubes and let it sit for 15-20 minutes. The smaller the cubes, the faster it will soften.



Need extra cooling racks? Take the cover off your ironing board (does anyone still use it for ironing anyway?) for an extra large cooling rack. An added benefit is that you can set it up anywhere to free up counter space.

Baked items turn out better when eggs are room temperature. To get eggs to room temperature fast, place them in a warm bowl of water for a few minutes.

Keep appetizers cool and attractive by filling a plastic baggie with crushed ice. Place the bag in the bottom of a bowl and cover with lettuce leaves. Scoop your appetizer onto the lettuce leaves and your appetizer will remain cool and tasty all night!



Quickly place a wooden spoon across the rim of a pot that's boiling over to settle the frothy bubbles and prevent more over-boiling.
