# National ITPA Office News



ITPA Pioneers from the National Office participated in the annual community Peanut Butter & Jelly drive to support the Manna House, a local food bank. Manna House provides meals for at risk children, disabled veterans, low-income families, senior citizens, under and individuals, homeless, and families of active duty service members.

More than 70% of the children in Liberty County schools are eligible for free or reduced lunch under low income guidelines. When schools are closed for summer and the school meal program is not available, Manna House and its community partners step in to help by collecting peanut butter and jelly for a summer lunch program.

Our volunteers were stationed at a local Walmart and asked shoppers to purchase and donate jars of peanut butter and jelly.

Normally, civilians are not allowed on the Fort Stewart Army Base. On June 21st, a rare exception to that rule was allowed when I and several dedicated volunteers were invited to join General Ramirez, the Garrison Commander, as soldiers hung big yellow bows on the gates at Fort Stewart. We were also invited to tour the new U.S. Army Museum. We consider this an honor and a privilege, and we are grateful to General Ramirez and (these soldiers for allowing us to participate.

At its broadest meaning, the display of yellow ribbons signifies home front support for American military personnel if not the war effort in general.

Bottles and caps washed in hot soapy water, rinsed and dried thoroughly, should be stored in ziplock bags marked "Clean Bottles." Local drop-off locations are: Comporium's HQ employee entrance, Tech Park Café and at Central Carolinas Animal Hosp., 2360 Celanese Rd, Rock Hill, SC. If you're not local to Rock Hill you can still participate by contacting our national office for information on where to mail your donated bottles.

The kids played games and won prizes. They enjoyed the day so much that as their parents arrived to pick them up, they asked to stay longer!




Goodie bags full of treats were given to each as they left for the day and they also played "Pioneer Punch," the game board that was featured at Assembly, to win additional prizes.




#### Did you know....

#### Sleeping Habits and Alzheimer's

The Alzheimer's Associated reported this year that more than 6 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's. An article by Jennifer Tenkelenberg, based on an interview with Dr. Ashley Mason, Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and core facility at the UCSF Osher Center of Integrative Medicine, stated getting enough sleep is one of the top 10 things we can do for brain health.

Tenkelenberg's article included the following statement from Dr. Maria Carillo, PhD, Alzheimer's Association chief science officer: "Research has shown us that not getting enough sleep because of insomnia or sleep apnea may result in problems with memory and thinking and increase the risk for Alzheimer's-related brain changes." Dr. Mason agreed with that assessment, stating, "There are so many benefits to sleep. It's a 24 hour a day problem, not just a nighttime problem. When you don't sleep your metabolism suffers, your risk for diabetes goes up, things are more difficult than they should be, we exercise less, people and situations can upset us more easily. and our emotional and cognitive bandwidths are smaller. Sleep will affect absolutely everything in your life, there is no getting away from it."

Dr. Mason also cited the benefits of a normal wake-up time. "Even if you slept poorly the night before, if your normal wake up time is at 8 a.m., then you should wake up at that time. Odds are the next night you'll probably sleep better because you didn't oversleep."

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## A Tribute In Memory of Guy Johnson



The ITPA mourns the passing of James Johnston, Jr., known fondly as "Guy," who passed away on May 21, 2022. James (Guy) Johnston, Jr. of Rock Hill, SC was born on September 23, 1940 in Charlotte, NC. He was the only child of Annie Mann Johnston and James Guy Johnston, Sr, and was the widower of Lynda Price Johnston.

After Guy's graduation from Georgia Military Academy in 1958, he enlisted and served as an Airman First Class in the U.S. Air Force. He later graduated from the University of North Carolina Charlotte with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Guy became a "telephone Guy" in 1972 when he began working at what was then Rock Hill Telephone Company as a Computer Operations Manager. He accepted a role with Associated Data Services (ADS) when that company was founded on January 1, 1974. Guy wore many hats during his tenure at ADS, as Operations Manager, Sales Manager and Access Specialist. He retired from Comporium Communications after 33 years in the telecommunications industry.

Guy was a member of several telco industry associations and was an active Pioneer. He was President of the Catawba Pioneer Club, President of the Palmetto (SC) Chapter, Region 4 Vice President, 2nd Vice President, 1st Vice President. He served as national ITPA president from 2000 to 2001, during which time he was instrumental in the move of our National ITPA Office and Museum from Washington, D.C. to Hinesville, GA.

After consistently demonstrating pioneering excellence and making significant contributions to his community through Pioneer activities, Guy was awarded the Pioneering Excellence Award, which is the highest honor the ITPA bestows to an individual.

Guy served as Chairman of the Bylaws Committee for many years and continued to serve on the committee after relinquishing that position. Guy He was a longtime member of the Historical Foundation, and served until his death. Guy was heavily involved with his community. He was elected to two terms on the York County Council where he chaired the Justice and Public Safety Committee. Under his supervision, the county adopted a county-wide E-911 system.

A devoted member of Friendship United Methodist Church in Rock Hill, SC, Guy was a Certified Lay Speaker and had served in several key leadership roles through the years. It was in this church that he loved where

family and friends celebrated his life during a memorial service on May 25th, officiated by Pastor Karen Starr.

That a number of Pioneers traveled to attend Guy's memorial service was a testament to the fact that he loved and was loved by the Pioneers he served with. He always had a kind word and a smile for everyone. Guy was fully engaged and supportive no matter what project he was helping with. He was a great person and Pioneer.

We recognize and remember Guy as one of a kind; a role model for us all.

# Lumen sells CenturyLink ILEC Assets in \$7.5 billion deal

Independent Local Exchange Carriers through which most of our clubs and chapters were founded have contributed to many changes in the telecommunications landscape. From the old step-by-step switches invented in 1888 to today's VoIP (voice over internet protocol) platform, telecommunications has been rapidly changing in recent years.

Most of us well recall the 1984 break-up of the Bell System (divestiture) into seven Baby Bell companies. Ironically, by 2018 most of the Bells were together again as a single company called AT&T. One of the Baby Bells, U.S. West, was bought by Qwest in 2000 and then by CenturyLink in 2011. CenturyLink itself came about in 2009 after CenturyTel acquired Embarq was a spin-off ILEC resulting from Sprint's acquisition of Nextel. When Embarg was established in 2006, it was the largest independent local exchange carrier in the U.S. Our club's namesake, Carolina Telephone & Telegraph Company, was by then one of Embarg's ILECs, having been acquired by United Telecommunications which eventually became Sprint. CenturyLink currently provides local telephone service in 36 states (plus a small territory in CA).

In September 2020 CenturyLink changed its name to Lumen Technologies, Inc. although the CenturyLink brand continues to be the customerfacing brand for traditional copper-based services [including Plain Old Telephone Service (POTS) that most of our club members worked with]. The Lumen brand focuses on nextgeneration connectivity solutions for large business customers.

In 2021, Lumen announced an agreement to sell its CenturyLink-branded assets across 20 states to Apollo Global Management. Apollo's new telecom division will operate as Brightspeed. CenturyLink in Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia are among those to be acquired by Apollo. The transaction is expected to close on Oct. 1, 2022, subject to the required regulatory approvals.

### **Barbequed Water Chestnuts**



## Ingredients:

- 2 Cans of whole water chestnuts
- 1 lb. bacon
- 1 large bottle BBQ Sauce (K.C. Masterpiece is recommended)
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1 cup catsup
- 1/2 cup brown sugar (or to taste)

## **Preparation:**

Cut bacon strips into 1/3 strips and wrap around water chestnuts. Secure with toothpick. Bake on a cookie sheet at 350°F until bacon is crisp (about 30 minutes). Put baked water chestnuts into a crockpot.

Combine BBQ sauce, vinegar, catsup and brown sugar and mix well. Pour mixture over the water chestnuts. Heat on high until mixture is hot, turn to low and serve while hot.

#### CROCK POT TIPS AND TRICKS

**PREHEAT YOUR SLOW COOKER!** A slow cooker is just like a small oven. Turn it on for 20 minutes before you begin piling your food in for the best outcome.



**KEEP THE LID CLOSED!** Every peek you take adds 15-20 minutes of cooking time to the overall cooking process.

DON'T ADD COLD MEAT. Room temperature meat is more relaxed and flexible, and the natural juices are more evenly distributed. Either brown meat before adding to your slow cooker or add room temperature meat.

**DON'T OVERCROWD YOUR COOKER.** For best results fill your slow cooker to somewhere between 1/2 and 2/3 full. Rather than crowd a small cooker, use a larger one to avoid overfilling.



**LAYER CORRECTLY.** For even cooking, cut food into uniform size pieces and layer your foods in a particular order. Place firm root vegetables such as carrots and potatoes at the bottom and pile meat on top.



ADD DAIRY LAST. Milk, sour cream and yogurt shouldn't go into the slow cooker with all the other ingredients. Those tend to break down in the slow cooker and should be stirred in during the last 15 minutes of cooking.

**USE LESS WINE!** Because the slow cooker is sealed, the alcohol won't evaporate as it does in a skillet or pot. A little goes a long way in a crock pot.

**TRIM THE FAT.** To avoid oily, greasy sauces and gravies, trim the excess fat from meat before placing in the slow cooker.



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
